

Developed by the ESEE® team during their SAR, swiftwater, and recreational rope activities, the Imlay features a blunted tip for safer use around tensioned ropes or rescue subjects, serrations to get through tough materials, double spine jimping for a more secure grip, O2 slot, secondary secure retention strap, and 440C stainless steel for use in wet environments.

To remove the knife, grab the extended tail of the retention strap and pull the strap off of the retention sheath button, then remove the knife by pulling back with your hand as you push the sheath forward with your thumb (Figure 1).

Retention sheath button can be placed in the top sheath hole (as shown in Figure 4), or the lower sheath hole, depending on what the user prefers.


If you use the standard Izula Clip Plate to carry this knife, the clip is made of steel and will eventually corrode or rust in a wet environment. We suggest attaching the knife to a harness with an accessory carabiner through the sheath hole (with secondary retention engaged), as shown in Figure 2. For attaching to a PFD or other items, we suggest lashing through the sheath holes with the supplied paracord, as shown in figure 3.

Be sure to always engage the secondary retention strap after sheathing the knife.

If you decide to remove or install the retention strap from the Imlay knife, be sure the knife is sheathed to avoid accidentally cutting yourself.







Use blue Lock Tite when assembling hardware, such as attaching the clip plate to the sheath.
